Nestled in the scenic and historic eastern foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains, Lynchburg College presents the total college experience to its students. From the beauty of its campus to the caliber of its faculty and the excellence of its athletic programs, Lynchburg College ranks among the best small colleges in the country.

From its beginning in 1903, Lynchburg College has been both strongly liberal arts in orientation and coeducational - - the second oldest private college in Virginia to be opened for both men and women. The College was founded as Virginia Christian College by Dr. Josephus Hopwood and changed its name to Lynchburg College in 1919.

Recognized as one of the South's most picturesque campuses, the 214-acre main campus features 36 buildings, most of Georgian style . The College's 470-acre Claytor Nature Study Center is located nearby in Bedford County. Considered one of Virginia's most diverse private colleges, Lynchburg College enrolls 2,400 undergraduate and graduate students from 35 states and six foreign countries.

LC offers 35 major and 43 minor fields of concentration through six Schools: Business and Economics, Communication and the Arts, Education and

Human Development, Health Sciences and Human Performance, Humanities and Social Sciences , and Sciences. The College offers 13 pre-professional programs, teacher licensure and gerontology certificate programs, an honors program, and master's programs in education, business, and English.

With a student/faculty ratio of 14:1, Lynchburg College offers a rich teaching and learning environment which encourages faculty/student interaction. The College boasts 159 full-time faculty, complemented by part-time faculty when their expertise fits the needs of students. Seventy-seven percent of full-time faculty members hold the Ph.D. or recognized terminal degree in their field.

LC continues to receive national recognition for the excellence of its faculty and programs. Lynchburg One of only two Virginia colleges, and forty nationwide, to be included in *Colleges That Change Lives* by Loren Pope, former education editor of The New York Times. Dr. Patty Hale, professor of nursing, was named 2003 Outstanding U. S. Professor of the Year for Master's Universities and Colleges by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education.

Dawn Simmons
Head Coach (Lynchburg, 1997)

One of the most prolific all-around athletes in the history of Lynchburg College women's athletics, Dawn Simmons completed her 10th season as the Hornets' skipper in 2008, posting more than 30 wins the last six years

This spring saw the Hornets go 39-8 - the best season in school history. LC won the ODAC regular-season and tournament titles and advance to the NCAA Division III Tournament for the second-straight year. LC won the Fayetteville Regional and advanced to the finals for the first time in program history. In 2007 LC won the ODAC Tournament and advanced into the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history. The Hornets won three games in regional competition and finished the year 36-13.

Simmons' 2006 team finished 30-15 - and led the Hornets in 2005 to a 31-9 record. LC tied for first place in the conference, and she was named the ODAC Coach of the Year for the third-straight season. Lynchburg was 14-2 in league play in 2003, 2004 and 2005.

During her tenure, the Gretna, VA, native has led the Hornets to an overall record of 282-135-1, including a 121-35 mark in the ODAC. In addition, Simmons has guided the LC women to 10-straight appearances to the ODAC Tournament.

A three-sport athlete for Lynchburg from 1993-97, Simmons appears frequently in the record books of the Hornets' volleyball, basketball and softball teams. As a softball player, Simmons had played more games (158) than any other athlete in the history of the program, until Lauren Lancaster broke it in 2006 (167). She also was the school's all-time leader in sacrifice hits.

Simmons graduated from Lynchburg in 1997 with her bachelor's degree in health, movement science and recreation.

She was also named to the National Fast Pitch Association Tournament for Division III Colleges All-Tournament Team in 2004. Amy Gillis joined the LC staff this spring for her first season in the coaching ranks. The Lynchburg native graduated from Roanoke College in 2007 with a degree in sociology and a minor in Education. Gillis was the two-time ODAC Scholar Athlete of the Year and was also named to the CoSIDA First Team Academic All-District team. She won 10 games and struck out 58 batters for the Maroons as a senior and finished her career among the program's top-five all-time in both wins and strikeouts. She was selected All-ODAC honorable mention as a senior. As a freshman, Gillis was named second-team All-ODAC after leading the Maroons in wins, ERA and strikeouts. She currently teaches in the Rustburg school district.

2008 Season Review

It was another record-breaking season for the Lynchburg College softball team. The 2008 team followed up the 2007 squad's run of success with an even better season, finishing 39-8, and advancing deep into post-season play.

The Hornets went 16-2 in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC) regular season to earn the top seed in the conference tournament. LC won three-straight games to take home the team's second-straight ODAC title and was named the top seed at the Fayetteville Regional. The Hornets outlasted six other squads for the right to make the first NCAA Finals trip in program history.



All-American Elizabeth Perkins

Senior third-baseman **Elizabeth Perkins (Kents Store, VA/ Fluvanna County)** was named to the NCAA Division III Softball All-American second-team, only the third individual to earn All-American honors in program history. Perkins, the 2008 ODAC Player of the Year, was also an all-Atlantic Region first-teamer. She led the conference in batting average (.425), on-base percentage (.561), slugging

percentage (.748), and walks (37). She blasted 11 home runs and added 49 RBI and 29 runs.

Perkins and fellow seniors **Kirstin Swank (Bear, DE/Caravel Academy)** and **Dara Sandifer (Monroe, VA/Holy Cross)** combined for a 136-45 record (75%) the last four seasons. Swank earned second-team all-conference honors this season after hitting .280 with six home runs and 29 RBI. Sandifer was solid all season and picked up her game in the post-season. She was named the ODAC Tournament's Most Outstanding Player, and also was named to the Fayetteville Regional's All-Tournament Team. For the season, Sandifer hit .331 with four home runs and 23 runs scored.



Several other Hornets enjoyed fine seasons and were rewarded with recognition. Junior centerfielder **Brittany Allsop (Milford, CT/ Jonathan Law)** earned second-team and second-team all-region honors after hitting .382 with a team-high 43 runs, seven doubles and 13 stolen bases. Freshman **Katie Bruce (Lanexa, VA/Lafayette)** was named the ODAC Pitcher of the Year and joined Perkins on the first-team. She boasted a 20-5 record, a 1.70 ERA and broke the school record for saves in a season (3). Bruce also contributed at the plate, hitting .342 with 32 RBI, second on the team. Junior first baseman **Tara Campbell (Leesburg, VA/Loudoun County)** hit .361 with eight home runs, and .500 on-base and .586 slugging percentages. She earned second-team All-Athletic Region accolades.

Junior **Barbie Miles (Kinsale, VA/Washington & Lee)** and Bruce provided a solid 1-2 punch in the pitcher's circle. She was 17-3 with a 2.78 ERA and 12 complete games. Sophomores **Lauren Duguay (Williamsburg, Va/Jamestown)** and **Audra Della Rosa (Rumford, RI/ St. Mary Academy Bay View)** manned the corner outfield positions, combining to start 75 times. Duguay, the left fielder, hit .267 with 18 runs and 12 RBI, while right fielder Della Rosa hit .252 with 36 runs scored and a team-high 22 sacrifice bunts. Both earned spots on the ODAC All-Tournament Team. Junior **Amber James (Manahawkin, NJ/ Southern Regional)** provided a solid defensive presence at second base, with a .957 fielding percentage and good range.

Sophomores **Leslie Bailey (Rockville, VA)**, **Savannah Tinsley (Lynchburg, VA/E.C. Glass)**, **Kelly Self (Christiansburg, VA/ Christiansburg)** and **Rachel Gallagher (Warrenton, VA/Fauquier)** contributed in limited roles and could be counted on to step up with the loss of three seniors. Freshmen **Sarah Spicer (Purcellville, VA/ Loudoun Valley)** and **Ashley Hohenberger (Wake Forest, NC/ Longwood)** each hit over .300 in their first seasons of collegiate softball and have chances for more playing time next year. Freshman **Caitlin Dolby (Laurel, DE/Laurel)** and sophomore **Melissa O'Hara (Leesburg, VA/Loudoun County)** each had ERAs of below 1.00 in limited action and sophomore **Lauren Ewing (West Caldwell, NJ/ James Caldwell)** was also effective in four relief appearances.

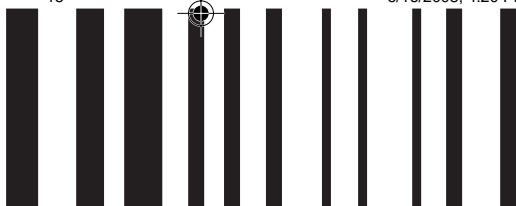

AUBREY R. MOON, JR. FIELD

Dr. Aubrey R. Moon, Jr. received his B.A. from Lynchburg College in 1956 and earned graduate degrees from the University of Tennessee and West Virginia University. He joined the College's faculty in 1961 where he taught health, movement science, and recreation courses. He served as a coach of men's basketball, cross-country, and indoor and outdoor track. He also founded the women's track program and ended his coaching career with championships in women softball. Dr. Moon was named Old Dominion Athletic Conference Coach of the Year in a variety of sports 12 different times over his 36 year tenure at the College. He was named to the LC Sports Hall of Fame in 1984, and in 1994 he was presented the Alumni Association's prestigious T. Gibson Hobbs Memorial Award for significant contributions to his church, community and Alma Mater.

Dr. Moon was department chair and director of intercollegiate and intramural activities from 1979-89. In April 2004, this field was renamed The Aubrey R. Moon, Jr. Field to honor and recognize Aubrey for his many contributions to the College. The women's softball dugouts were made possible by College resources and memorial gifts from family, alumni, colleagues and friends.





The Old Dominion Athletic Conference Since 1976

Celebrating its 32nd year, the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC) is one of the nation's largest Division III conferences. The 14-member ODAC, including one associate status, stands as the second-largest multi-sport NCAA Division III conference in the country.

The league was formed on May 18, 1975 as the Virginia College Conference and began operations in September of 1976. (The name change to Old Dominion Athletic Conference became effective January 1, 1976). Charter members were eight colleges located in the state of Virginia: Bridgewater College, Eastern Mennonite College, Emory & Henry College, Hampden-Sydney College, Lynchburg College, Randolph-Macon College, Roanoke College and Washington & Lee University.

From its initial year of operation through the 1981-82 academic year, the ODAC sponsored competition in 10 men's varsity sports, including football, soccer, and cross country in the fall; basketball, wrestling, and indoor track and field in the winter; and baseball, golf, tennis, and outdoor track and field in the spring. Women's sports were added prior to the 1982-83 school year. Today, the ODAC has grown to sponsor championships in 22 sports (10 men and 12 women) and houses nine full-time coeducational institutions with four single-gender schools making up the current 13 full-time members.

The conference expanded in the late 1980s, early 1990s and most recently in 1999. Virginia Wesleyan became the 13th member of the conference in 1988 and began full-scale competition in the league in the 1989-90 academic year. Guilford College, voted into the conference in the spring of 1990, began competing for conference championships in the 1991-92 season. The Catholic University of America (DC) was accepted for associate membership in football on January 12, 1999.

Over the past 15 years the conference and the City of Salem, Va., have gained national attention through hosting five NCAA Division III championships in football, men's basketball, softball, baseball and volleyball. The growing list of titles passed out in Salem began in the fall of 1993 with the DIII Football championship. Through the 2006-07 academic year, the conference and city have hosted 39 NCAA Division III Championships since the '93 Stagg Bowl. This year the two will serve as hosts to the DIII football, men's basketball, women's lacrosse and softball championships.

Governance:

The Conference is governed by a 13-member Presidential body consisting of all of the full-time member CEOs. Lynchburg's Dr. Kenneth Garren is the chair of the ODAC Presidents' Council. In addition to presidential leadership, the conference's day-to-day operations are supervised by its Board of Directors, which consists of all conference member Directors of Athletics. Sweet Briar Director of Athletics Kelly Morrison serves as the current Board President with Randolph-Macon's Denis Kanach serving as President-Elect.

The conference office is located in Salem, Virginia at 402B Idaho Street.

Dr. Kenneth R. Garren became Lynchburg College's tenth president on August 1, 2001. The former vice president and dean of the college at Roanoke College, is a native of Augusta, Georgia. Dr. Garren earned his baccalaureate degree in mathematics from Roanoke College, his master's degree from The College of William and Mary, and his Ph.D. from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University.

Dr. Garren was associated with Roanoke College for 34 years, serving as

chief academic officer, associate dean, and professor of mathematics. He served as a visiting professor at the University of Virginia and Virginia Tech, was a member of the adjunct faculty of the Command and General Staff College of the U. S. Army, and served as Consulting Faculty member in the Army's Graduate Degree Program at Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas.

Dr. Garren is married to the former Sheila Johnston, a public school teacher, and they have three grown children. The Garrens are known as a family of scholars, since all three children have doctoral degrees.



Dr. Jack M. Toms
Director of Athletics

A successful administrator, professor, and coach, Dr. Jack M. Toms is in his 30th year at Lynchburg College.

Dr. Toms, who has served Lynchburg as director of athletics since 1989, has been a member of numerous local and regional committees over the years. He served as vice-president of the Old Dominion Athletic Conference from 1992-94 and president from 1994-96. He continues to serve on a number of committees within the conference. In addition, Toms has been very active in

the NCAA and the National Association for College Directors of Athletics. Prior to his current appointment, he served as associate director of athletics at Lynchburg College from 1986-89.

In addition to his service within the ranks of college athletics, Toms has also been recognized for his contributions to high-school athletics. In 1999, he was presented with a distinguished service award from the Virginia High School league for his efforts.

Dr. Toms received his Ed. D. from West Virginia University, his M. Ed. from the University of Virginia, and his B.A. from Lynchburg College. Dr. Toms and his wife, Theresa, have two sons.
